

Early Businesses in Wilsonia

Following centuries of Native American presence in and around present day Wilsonia, hunters and trappers made their livelihood in the area beginning in the 1870s. The early 1890s saw the removal of most of the property's magnificent Sugar Pine trees by the Smith Comstock Lumber Company. Logging in this area was ended in 1895 and beginning in 1900, new owner E.O. Miller opened the area to campers, largely people from the Valley seeking relief from the summer heat. Some of these campers built wooden platforms upon which to pitch their tents for extended stays into the beginning of autumn. Miller's campground continued to be a camping

destination through 1917. In 1918, new owners, Andy and Arza Ferguson named the property "Wilsonia" after President Wilson and real estate became the prime business in the area. Ferguson subdivided most of the property into 292 lots and offered them for sale at \$50 each. Over the next few years lot prices increased to \$125, \$200, then \$400.



Wilsonia's first grocery store was opened in 1924 in the <u>octagonal</u> Wilsonia Clubhouse. Located in the same location as the current Clubhouse, the new structure also housed a barber shop and meat market. The Clubhouse had an open central area where campfires were held. Around the perimeter of the building was a covered dance floor and band stand where live bands from the valley performed once or twice weekly during the summer.

A horse rental and pack train business was started in 1925 by Dick and Velma Wilson, a horse ranching family from the Hanford area. In addition to their stable and horse rentals, the Wilsons operated the store in the Wilsonia Clubhouse. Soon a small dairy was established in the Big Stump area with cattle grazing in the meadows and a small bottling operation in a tent atop one of the large stumps. The milk came by wagon to Wilsonia and Grant Grove. Just south of Big Stump a chicken farm operated to provide fresh eggs for Wilsonia residents, employees, and visitors to the "General Grant" National Park. Between 1925 and 1932 a bakery operated at the western edge of the present-day Park Road parking lot.

After the original Clubhouse burned in 1928, a new building was built in the same location. This building collapsed under heavy snow during the winter of 1932-33. Club members built back this building which still stands.

When the original Clubhouse burned in the summer of 1928, the Wilsons built an entry and walk-up window into their cabin's front bedroom so that they could continue to sell groceries. A new Clubhouse was built on the same location.

Andy Ferguson built a new store building on a lot along Park Road, the entry route to General Grant National Park.

During the 1930s another retail store and gas station were open for business along Park Road and the Fresno Bee was delivered on horseback by Dottie Wilson. Around the same time the former chicken ranch was converted to a chinchilla farm. There the store operated until 1942 when it burned to the ground. There was no store in Wilsonia until 1946 when a third store building was built in the same location, funded by a group of Wilsonia property owners. This building remained in operation until it was destroyed by fire in 1959.

Rebuilt in 1960, the Wilsonia Lodge included a store, a restaurant, and guest rooms.

The Wilsonia Lodge and the nearby Kings Canyon Lodge "Touch of Holland" (incorporating Wilsonia's first cabin owned by Andy and Arza Ferguson in the area of the present-day dumpsters) provided meals and nightly accommodations to Wilsonians and Park visitors. By the early 1990's, these properties had been purchased by the government and the buildings removed.





